

Consultation on closure of Bollington tip

As we have reported on in previous editions of this newsletter, Cheshire East council are proposing to close Bollington tip (along with Poynton's tip) over the next few months. It was originally scheduled to be temporarily closed on 1st April, but this was postponed. Here at the Bridgend Centre, we are very concerned about this as it reduces the level of waste disposal service available to the people of Bollington. The nearest tip to our town will be Macclesfield, which involves an eight mile round trip to access, and so increases costs and carbon emissions associated with disposing our rubbish. As a result it is likely that fly-tipping will increase in our beautiful area.



Cheshire East Council are currently carrying out a consultation on various elements of its medium term financial strategy (2024-2028), including the closure of Bollington and Poynton tips. To get your voice heard on this, you can respond to the consultation. The point in the strategy relevant to the Bollington tip closure is number 96 (on page 101 of the strategy):

[96] Review of Household Waste Recycling Centres [Revised] Permanent rationalisation of HWRC provision within the borough, as identified through the outputs from the now established HWRC Review, the scope of which was confirmed by the Environment and Communities Committee in September 2023. The Review is aligned to the need to procure a new operating contract to be in place by April 2025 at latest.

The consultation will close on 16th June 2024.





Friends of Bollington Library

Friends of Bollington Library (FoBL), founded at the turn of this year, aims to raise awareness and use of our Library by supporting the staff & the service. We plan to run events and activities to raise funds to achieve these aims. We've already hosted a popular literary quiz and talk about the 200 year-old history of a library in Bollington.

At the end of April we learned that Cheshire East Council may be planning consultations about the possible closure of a quarter of the public libraries in the Borough, including the Bollington



Library. FoBL acted immediately to tell people about this potential loss of one of Bollington's key assets. Since then we have placed articles in local media outlets to promote the value of this very valuable community resource.

A library is a warm, safe space at the heart of a community for meeting together, education and entertainment. Staff at the Bollington library offer a welcome and informed guidance on how to apply for Blue Badges, bus passes and much more. A Dementia group meets there regularly and four reading groups source their bookboxes from the library. A library is NOT just about books. A library is a community's source of authenticated factual information to inform and enlighten people of all ages.

We now boast over 300 followers on our Facebook group and only a slightly smaller number of people have become members of the Friends of Bollington Library group. (Just email fobollib@gmail.com to join us). Also, a very practical help is for everyone **to** join the Bollington Library itself, because statistics count; they demonstrate usage and support. It's FoBL's aspiration to boost official library membership by 30%. We will be working over the coming months to promote the value of our library and our clear wish for it to stay open for the community.

Aurora Borealis

On the night of 10th May, the people of Bollington and indeed most of the northern hemisphere were treated to a wonderful display of Aurora Borealis, or 'Northern Lights' as they are also known. It came as somewhat of a surprise to many people and a lot of people (including me!), went to bed and missed them. However our area was clearly treated to an unprecedented visual display in the night's sky and many photographers were present to record the occasion for posterity.

The northern lights are created when energized particles from the sun hit the Earth's upper atmosphere at speeds of up to 45 million mph (72 million kph), but our planet's magnetic field protects us from this. As Earth's magnetic field redirects the particles toward the poles — there

are southern lights too, the dramatic process transforms into a cinematic atmospheric phenomenon that dazzles and fascinates scientists and skywatchers alike. *Photos by Rik Hodkinson and Sarah Leadbetter*

I'd heard a lot about how good the Screaming Beavers have been at past festivals, so I was really looking forward to seeing them on the Saturday evening. They lived up to their





Merlin - a great app for Twitchers!

A new toy we have been getting endless fun out of recently is the Merlin bird app created by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. The app's main mission is to help people identify what that bird you have spotted is, either by its appearance or by its song.

In terms of a sighting of a bird, Merlin asks you a few questions about its characteristics (such as size, colours and behaviour) and location, as an expert birder would. It then tells you what bird you have seen, using 800 million descriptors submitted to them from birders all around the world. When you have identified a species and clicked on 'this is my bird', Merlin saves your response in order to improve the data for future performances.

Another great feature which I love is the 'Sound ID'. Just press record in a location of your choice and the app identifies what bird song it can hear. The graphic here shows what birds could be heard in my garden in urban Macclesfield one evening, I was very surprised!

Sound ID in the Merlin Bird ID app is currently available for 1,054 species of birds. This includes comprehensive coverage in the United States, Canada, Europe, and the Western Palearctic, and coverage of more common and widespread species in the Neotropics and India. Anyone with a smart phone can make recordings and all the data contributes towards research into what birds

are present in which locations.

Recipe - Asparagus Risotto

Ingredients

1 bunch of asparagus

800ml vegetable stock

1 tablespoon olive oil

25g butter

1 small onion (finely

chopped)

175g risotto rice


100ml wine (optional)

25g Parmesan cheese



Method

- 1. Cut off the woody ends of the asparagus and put them in a saucepan with the stock. Put on a low heat and gently simmer. Meanwhile cut off the tips of the asparagus and add to the stock for exactly one minute. Scoop out with a slotted spoon and set aside. Finely slice the remainder of the asparagus stalks.
- 2. Heat the oil and half the butter in a wide, heavy pan. Cook the onions gently for 5 minutes until soft, stirring often. Add the chopped asparagus stalks and cook for 2 minutes more. Add the risotto rice and stir continuously for a few minutes until it is semi-transparent and making a hissing sound.
- 3. Stir in the wine, if using, it will evaporate almost immediately. Reduce the heat to a gentle simmer. Add the stock, a ladle at a time, stirring with each addition until it has absorbed. This should take 15 minutes.
- 4. Try the rice, it should feel just cooked with a slight bite to it. Stir in the asparagus tips and any last dregs of stock and cook for 1-2 minutes more. Remove from the heat and top with the remaining butter and most of the parmesan. Season generously, cover and leave to settle for a few minutes.
- 5. Give the risotto a stir through to incorporate the butter and cheese and serve straightaway. Sprinkle with the remaining parmesan to serve.
