Events in Bollington over the festive period

Project Bridgend update







Project Bridgend continues apace with the first floor rooms being renovated now that the stone roof has been replaced. The iconic white walls outside have been repainted and we are currently waiting for the new wooden windows, which we hope will transform the front of the building.

The Bridgend Centre is very old, having been built in approximately the 16th century. It started life as a farmhouse, with the people living on the first floor and their livestock being housed on the ground floor. The building has had a number of uses over the centuries, in the mid 20th century, the building was a garage, complete with petrol pumps on the forecourt!

You will notice that the floor level of the Bridgend Centre is substantially lower than the ground and road in front of it. This is because the building pre-dates the canal, the time when the ground between the canal and Bridgend was significantly raised by the addition of earth from the first, failed, attempt at building the embankment. 'Throstles Nest', the cottage opposite the Bridgend Centre, is similarly set down in the ground.

The new rooms created over the last few months will be available for hire, including in the evenings and at weekends, from January onwards. In addition, we are looking at expanding our timetable of activities so if there are any new activities or groups you would like to see at the Bridgend Centre, please do get in touch (feedback form below).

Huge thanks goes to the National Lottery Community Fund for making this happen and making our building fit for the next 20 years at least. Also a big thank you goes to Hogbens Chartered Surveyors for managing the project so well and to East Cheshire Joinery for their skill and expertise in transforming our ancient building with minimal disruption to us or our neighbours.

You may have noticed that the Bridgend Centre is one of Bollington Co-op's chosen charities for the year October 2025 to October 2026.

This means that if you log into your Co-op app and chose us as your chosen charity, a proportion of everything you spend will be sent to us to fund gentle and accessible exercise classes for people in our community, at no extra cost to you.

A Co-op is owned by its members and they get to say how it is run and what happens to the profits from the business. The Co-op supports its local community in the form of this funding because its members have said that that is how they want some of the company's profits to be spent.

There are co-ops everywhere across the world, of all sizes and industries. The Co-op Group that owns the Bollington store is one of the largest in the world and also owns funeral, insurance and legal services businesses.

This group has its origins in the co-operative consumer societies started by the Rochdale Pioneers. In 1863, independent co-op societies formed The Co-operative Wholesale Society (CWS). They provided Co-op products to sell in hundreds of Co-op stores. Over the next century, CWS went through many changes and eventually became The Co-operative Group.

Recipe - Creamy bacon and Brussel sprout roast potato topper



Ingredients

125g floury potatoes (like Maris Piper)

1 heaped tbsp plain flour

1 tsp onion granules

1 tsp dried rosemary

50ml olive oil

For the sauce

20g butter

100g smoked bacon roughly chopped

100g brussels sprouts shredded

1 tbsp garlic paste

2 tsp Worcestershire sauce

2 tbsp wholegrain mustard

Heat the oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7. Cook the potatoes in a pan of boiling salted water for 10-12 mins. Drain in a colander, then shake gently to rough up the edges

Meanwhile, combine the flour, onion granules, rosemary and some seasoning in a bowl. Pour the oil into a baking tray and put in the oven for a few minutes to heat up.


Tip the potatoes into the bowl with the flour mixture and toss to coat. Carefully tip the potatoes into the hot oil in the tray, then roast for 30 mins, or until crisp and golden, turning halfway through.

For the sauce, melt half the butter in a frying pan over a medium heat and fry the bacon for 5-6 mins until starting to crisp, then remove to a bowl using a slotted spoon. Set aside

Add the rest of the butter to the pan and cook the sprouts for 8-10 mins until softened. Add the garlic paste, Worcestershire sauce and mustard, and cook for 5 mins more. Return the bacon to the pan, tip in the cream and season to taste. Cook for 2-3 mins more, or until the sauce has thickened slightly

Remove the potatoes from the oven, tip onto a serving platter and spoon over the creamy sauce. Serve hot
