Message from the Chair



2018-2019 marked a hugely significant year in the history of the Bridgend Centre. In December 2018, we were able to purchase our building at 104 Palmerston Street, which was funded with a hugely generous grant of £150,000 from the Garfield Weston Foundation and a mortgage of £130,000 from Charity Bank. This is a great achievement for our charity as it means we can be more confident about occupying the building for many more years to come.

Our services have grown from strength to strength this year with more people than ever coming through our doors (on average 87 adults per day). This year we also launched two major projects, the Heritage Walking Trails and Bridgend Buddies. The Heritage Walking trails project has the aim of renovating eight wonderful walking trails that start from the Bridgend Centre and explore the wonderful surrounding Bollington countryside. Bridgend Buddies was expanded into a significant project with a much larger scope, thanks to funding from Comic Relief. This project supports 28 lonely people in the community and 28 volunteers, with the aim of reducing social isolation and improving their lives.

We are fortunate to have such hardworking and highly skilled employees, who work day in day out to ensure our doors are always open and the kettle is always on. Thank you so much to all our volunteers who play such an important role in many areas, for example, in the Charity Shop, Community Kitchen and Woodcraft Workshop. I would also like to thank my fellow Trustees for their dedication and hard work.

This dedication, shown by staff and volunteers alike, came to the fore following the recent devastating flood which engulfed the Centre. An army of volunteers rushed to help and worked tirelessly alongside staff to ensure the Centre re-opened its doors only six days later! Thank you to you all for your tireless support for our Centre.

Financial Overview

2018-2019 was an extraordinary year for the Bridgend Centre as we purchased our building. We received a grant from the Garfield Weston Foundation of £150,000 to assist us with this purchase and the funded the remaining £130,000 of the purchase price through a mortgage from the Charity Bank.


This had a significant effect on our accounts for the financial year to 31 March 2019 and some of the figures are very unusual for our organisation this year.

This year we received a total income of £350,853 (compared with £156,935 in 2017-2018). A significant part of this was the £150,000 grant from Garfield Weston. Income from our charity shop was £82,619, a considerable increase of £14,917 on the previous year (18% increase).



Expenditure was £165,302 (£141,613 in 2017-2018). This was in line with expectations and reflected the Charity's growth .


Net current assets, not including the value of the building, were £157,006 at the year end. £22,120 of this is restricted funds to spend on already allocated projects. We also plan to spend a substantial amount on improvements to the building next year, including a new roof.
