

Recipe— Cranberry and Clementine Eccles Cake

Jo Maitland sent us this gorgeous sounding recipe in. We can't wait to try them ourselves!

Ingredients

1 packet of puff pastry or make your own rough puff pastry instead; 20g butter; 150g dried cranberries; 2 tbsp chopped mixed peel (I never bother with this); 50g demerara sugar (or any sugar really); zest of 2 clementines; 1 teaspoon of mixed spice; 1 egg beaten; 3 tablespoon caster sugar.

Method

Preheat oven to 200 degrees c/gas 6. In a small pan melt the butter. Add the cranberries, mixed peel, demerara sugar, zest and spice. Heat gently and stir until sugar has dissolved. Remove from the heat and leave to cool completely.



On a floured surface roll out the pastry to the thickness of a pound coin. Cut out 10 circles by re-rolling the trimmings. I use my largest biscuit cutter which is 10cm diameter.

Divide the fruit between each of the circles of pastry leaving 1cm rim around the edge. Brush the edge with water and pull the edges of pastry to the centre, pinch together and turn over on the floured surface. Gently roll out a little wider taking care not to break the pastry.

Place them on a baking sheet (I lined mine with my non stick baking sheet), brush with the beaten egg, sprinkle generously with the caster sugar. Make 3 slits in the top of each with a sharp knife and bake for around 15 minutes until golden. They will store for a couple of days in an airtight container apparently.

Originally from Crewe, I moved to Macclesfield in 2008 when I married Heather, from Poynton. I describe myself as an 'architectural illustrator', preferring to draw the manmade beauty of architecture over that of the local countryside, from my home studio in Macclesfield.

Fine pen drawing is my usual style, and I can spend around 20-90 hours drawing detailed buildings and landmarks. More recently I have been working on a more contemporary, graphic style that I think lends itself perfectly to my 'Macclesfield Collection', which aims to showcase the very best of the town's architecture and landmarks. It's an ongoing passion but I aim to illustrate most of the town's historical buildings and landmarks - it certainly won't be a quick undertaking! I

also take on commissions for building illustrations and was delighted to recently take on the Bridgend Centre. After studying Art & Design at South Cheshire College, I went on to the University of Wales to achieve a BA (hons) degree in Animation. I set up my photography business in 2012 and turned my illustration hobby into an online business in 2016. Illustrating the

architectural history of the town is my way of honouring the amazing architects, labourers and visionaries that came before us and I urge everybody to just pause and take in historical buildings, wherever they are, and admire the craftsmanship and fine details that adorn them. *AdamFrancisArt sells items on Etsy*


